In addition, Maharam and RISD are pleased to announce the 2016 recipients of the Maharam STEAM Fellowship in Applied Art and Design. In keeping with the spirit of the program, these fellows will enter arenas rarely seen by art and design students, where they will have the opportunity to effect real change in policy and practice in local and global organizations and communities. Their areas of focus include robotics, water rights, prisoners' rights, genetics, immigration services, international relations, the military, children's mental health issues, and housing in impoverished countries. With the addition of this incoming group, 42 RISD students will have participated in the fellowship, working in 15 states and 9 countries.
